1st VP

The last time I wrote an article for the News and Views, I wrote about the "Inner Game of Horseshoes", and I was eagerly anticipating the pitching season! My pitching elbow which had bothered me for the last year or so was finally feeling good, and I was looking forward to the Vallejo tournament in early March to get my season started. Suddenly, all you heard about was

the Covid-19 Virus, and the Governor was closing down Parks, and prohibiting gatherings of more than 10 people, and we had no horseshoe pitching! Like all of you, I really miss our horseshoe pitching! It definitely gives us all a chance to reflect on how important our sport is in our lives. As Joni Mitchell sang, "You don't know what you got till it's gone!....they take paradise and put up a parking lot!" I hope that the powers that be will soon see their way to allow us to get back to normal, in my opinion it seems like we have over-reacted to this Virus. I feel it is important that we all get back to work. and back to play as soon as possible! I miss that sound of a horseshoe tournament, and look forward to hearing it again! We may need to find a way to be safer in regards to spreading the Virus while we play horseshoes in the coming months. It doesn't appeal to me to wear a mask while pitching, but we can possibly be creative enough to think of ways to "distance" while pitching! I think it is important for horseshoe pitching to get going soon, in many ways we are like the many small business' across the country, that can't afford to stay closed for too long without risking never reopening!

It is great to see some of the creativity shown by horseshoe pitchers doing the "online pitching".....that may really become an important part of horseshoe pitching going forward. When people really love something like their favorite sport, it is amazing how inventive they can become in finding a way to do it! It has been great to be able to pitch on my court in my backyard, and I rarely miss a day, sometimes getting out for 2 or 3 short sessions a day, but as much as I enjoy practicing, I definitely miss going to the tournaments to spend time with horseshoe pitching friends, and to see if the practice time will reflect in higher ringer percentages or better tournament performance.

I love books, and I have always thought it would be nice to have a copy of Roy W. Smith's Science at the Stake written in 1946. There is a copy available to view on the NHPA website [Click on "Rules & Bylaws", then click on "Rules", then click on "Old Rule Book"] I've always enjoyed this book, it is certainly the classic description of the fundamentals of how to throw a turn shoe, and I think all horseshoe pitchers should read it. It gives some good flavor of horseshoe pitching in the 30's and 40's, along with some history of the sport, and a few interesting pictures. While browsing a used book site on line I found a copy of the book available. Yeah baby! So for \$30 and \$5 shipping I now have my copy of Science at the Stake! It is quite a small book, only 4" x 6". I suppose it was designed to carry in your back pocket as you pitched. The original blue cover has badly faded, the previous owner's name "Marian S. Courtney" is written on the cover....I imagine of course that he was a pitcher. There was an original price tag for 50 cents inside the book from the University Book Store [I imagine it was USC, since the book was sent from a

store in Los Angeles.] On page 52 of the book, under the heading "Pitch Horseshoes for Health and Recreation", Smith writes, "Horseshoe Pitching is not only one of the oldest and best established games in the world, but is regarded by all who are associated with it as being one of the cleanest and most healthful forms of recreation. Besides teaching one a perfect coordination of the muscles and mental faculties, it develops the powers of concentration and endurance." He goes on to write that, "Physicians, who have studied the game, pronounce it to be conducive to long life and have found that very few players are ever troubled with Frank Jackson, many times a world appendicitis. champion and affectionately known as "The Grand Old Man of the Horseshoe Game," has stated: "Throughout the many years I have played the game, I have never known of a horseshoe pitcher to suffer from **appendicitis**" It is well worth knowing that a person can enjoy this splendid sport and keep physically fit at the same time." I include this short excerpt from the book. because as you might have guessed by now, after two days of pain in my lower right abdomen, I spent 3 days in Lodi Memorial Hospital over Mother's Day weekend having my appendix removed. When the emergency room physician told me that I had "acute appendicitis," I should have told him "That can't be possible doc, I'm a horseshoe pitcher!" The doctor told me that my appendix was very enlarged, and partially gangrenous, so I spent a couple of days in the hospital on I.V. antibiotics. They did the procedure "arthroscopically" so the incisions are minimal, and I've already been back to pitching in the back yard, so once the shutdown lifts, I'm ready to go! Frank Elroy Jackson of Kansas, renowned appendicitis expert, was said to have won the title of World Champion 13 times in the early 1900s (The NHPA lists him as World Champion 7 times from 1909 to 1926.) His final World Tournament was in 1935 where at age 65 he finished 5th place with a ringer average of 72.9% Ted Allen won that 1935 tournament, with Guy Zimmerman finishing fourth, just ahead of Frank. Jackson barnstormed the country pitching shoes in exhibitions until 1940. He operated a motel in Tampa, Florida where he died in 1955 at the age of 85. I could find no cause of death so I can only assume it wasn't from a burst appendix!

It was a disappointment when the World Tournament in Louisiana was canceled. I was looking forward to checking out New Orleans, the food, the history, and the music. I'm really glad the NHPA decided to hold the tournament in Monroe, LA again in three years! In planning for the trip I ran into a Jazz Band called "Tuba"

Skinny" on Youtube. If you at all like New Orleans Jazz, and traditional Jazz and Blues, check them out on Youtube. They started as a street band in 2009.....a great sound...very fun, happy music....some talented musicians!

I hope to see you all very soon on the courts. I think that it is so important that the NCHPA comes roaring back! Everyone should try to pitch in as many tournaments as possible, put extra effort into growing the clubs with new members, maybe even buying some new shoes to support the horseshoe manufacturers! If we can get back to pitching soon, and if Southern California holds strong on holding the State Tournament in Bakersfield, it will not be a lost pitching year! *George Davis*.

we are proud to announce that Horseshoe pitching in Vallejo is a go!

Protocol for pitching in Vallejo:

- 1 = 6 foot Distance
- 2 = Facemasks (Suggested) Not Required
- 3 =No Shared Food
- 4 = Bring your own Water / Drinks
- 5 = Bring your own Cups
- 6 = Bathrooms will be open for Horseshoe Pitchers only (locked & opened for Horseshoe pitchers only)
- 7 = Bathrooms to be wiped down every 2 Hours by Horseshoe personnel
- 8 = Gate entrance to be wiped down by Horseshoe personnel every 2 Hours
- 9 = No Handling of another person's Horseshoes (pick up your own shoes)

I hope to see everyone at the pits on Sunday June 28th for the Ben Yost tournament, remember: practice, practice, practice. Thanks *Dave Lane*

Sonoma County (Santa Rosa)

Last Sunday 12 of us met at the courts for the first time since this Covid-19 fiasco appeared on the scene. It turned out to be a fun time. The gates to Doyle Park were unlocked on Monday the 15th of June finally. This will allow us to continue our sanctioned league on Thursdays. As of now we will continue holding tournaments on July 11, it's number 72 on the schedule. Half Moon Bay

The Half Moon Bay Horseshoe Club hopes all of you are doing well with the shelter in place situation and hope you were able to find Horseshoe courts to pitch on. Our Club has lost 5 NHPA tournaments & 3 Club tournaments. We will try to reschedule tournaments if possible & practical.

I have found a quick way to measure close ringers (this works for me). I take my strait edge measuring tool and place it at one of the tips of the shoe. While touching the tip I also place the strait edge against the stake and slide it down the stake. If it is touching the tip of one side of shoe and the strait edge lands on top of the other side of the shoe, it is a ringer. If it slides against the other shoe tip, it is a

three-point touch and is not a ringer. If it does not touch the other tip of the shoe it is not a ringer. This is also a good visual aid if you don't like to dig out the clay and you can also see if you need to go through the effort of digging out the clay for a measurement.


The NCHPA has been trying to get all our Clubs to use HS Master. We realize that some clubs have problems with computers! We have solutions for any reason your club is not using HS Master and we want to Help. If you can do Face Time or something similar on your cell phone, we can help you easily. This is the best time learn before we start pitching again.

During the shelter in place I started pitching with my partner in crime Richard Robbins using Face Time (we pitch in our own backyards) & the HPO (Horseshoe Pitching Online (on Facebook). During this time, one of my pits failed. It was built in 2007 and one pit finally fatigued as the stake ripped out of the plywood base. I documented rebuilding this pit so I could reproduce it in the future (being 70, I might need someone else to build it for me when I am 100). So, I decided to share how I built one of my pits. This is just another way to build a pit. See you on the Courts, *Rick Della Santina*

Tip 1 — Improve Your Drop Angle


The simplest way to improve your Drop Angle is to surround the stake with a 15" used rubber tire (see image below). If not a rubber tire, then a length of 4×4 across the pit about 6" in front of the stake. Calculations indicate that a horseshoe arriving at a Drop Angle of between 30 Degrees to 45 Degrees (see images below) will tend to stay within the 13" scoring circle (see image below). Your goal is to drop the horseshoe onto the stake without hitting the sidewall or the 4×4 when arriving. The shoe will then arrive softer, which reduces rejection, and allows you to pitch the horseshoe with less effort the required distance. Remember, the higher you pitch the horseshoe, with the same initial velocity (speed), the greater the distance traveled (up to 45 degrees).

Using Tip 1 will not only help with your Drop Angle, but, direction and distance.




Any horseshoe 6-1/2" short is a possible ringer or point The scoring range for 30 degrees is 12-1/2".

The image above displays the arrival of a horseshoe at 30 degrees.




The image above displays the arrival of a horseshoe at 45 degrees. Note that the greater drop angle gives you more potential for staying within the 13" scoring circle and allows you to arrive at the stake a bit higher up.



15" Used Tire

The image above represents the use of a 15" used tire for improving your arrival at the stake. The tire above left, shows a cutout that allows me to see the bottom of the stake from the approach. Removing the bottom sidewall makes the removal of the cutout easier. Your goal here is to throw the horseshoe high enough to clear the sidewall at arrival, and land within your scoring circle. This simple aid will immediately improve your "Drop Angle" arrival.



Drop Angles to Maximize Points Within Range

Tamper Positioning for 30 and 45 Degree Drop Angle

The 43" tamper that I use to prepare my clay pit works great to position a target over my Line of Flight at a distance from the stake to improve my "Drop Angle." This is a more effective way to provide a target over the previously mentioned string above.



13 Inch Scoring Circle

The NHPA uses 6" for measurement of a single point. The image above represents the scoring circle available to capture those single points in "Count All" or cancellation matches.




PORTABLE HORSESHOE PIT

Materials Needed:

- $1 4 \times 8 \times 3/4$ sheet of plywood.
- 1 8 ft 2 x 4
- 1 6 ft 2 x 4
- 1 Horseshoe stake welded to a plate 4" x 6" with 4 holes.
- $4 \text{hex bolts } 3/8 \times 1-1/2$
- 4 Nylon lock nuts 3/8
- 2 16" 12 gage Heavy Duty Strap
- 1-3' of 90-degree metal.
- 1 Box 10 x 3 Stainless Outdoor Screws w/ Best corrosion Protection.
- 1-1 gallon of Waterguard Clear Wood Sealer.
- 1 Wood Stain

Cut the ply wood into 3 pieces. 4 ft. x 3 ft, & 2 pieces 4 ft x 15 inches. Cut the 2 x 4's to frame the 4 x 3(2 three-foot length's). Cut 4 triangular pieces to fit in the corners. Water treat all of the wood several times. Stain all the 2 x 4's. Paint the Heavy-Duty strap & 90-degree metal with several coats of paint.

Attach the stake to the 4×3 . To center the stake, find the middle of both lengths of the 4×3 and draw a line from side to side & top to bottom. It should look like an elongated plus sign. Find the middle of both lengths of the Stake plate and mark dots on the edge of those points. Place the stake on the 4×3 and line up the plate dots with 4×3 lines.



Mark and drill your holes for the stake plate & heavy-duty straps. *Make sure that one strap is for the front 2 holes & one strap is for the back holes. Bolt the stake plate to the plywood using the heavy-duty straps as a washer on the bottom side.



Attach the 2 x 4's (including the 4 triangular pieces & the 3' 90-degree piece for the top edge of the front 2×4) to the stake side (top) of the plywood. Attach the $2 \times 4 \times 15$ " pieces to the bottom of the plywood, sandwiching the heavy-duty straps. *This will keep the bolts off the ground, add strength to the stake and provide air flow to prevent a constant moist environment.
