TURNING THE CLAY

Horseshoe pitchers like soft clay, it equals close points and ringers.

I interviewed Tom Webb, who was a top pitcher for years and one of the best at turning clay. Follow these Steps in preparing your clay court.

- 1. Test the clay with your shovel be fore doing anything. Press the shovel down in the clay to feel whether it is hard, medium, soft or wet. This will give you a better idea of the moisture content then just looking at it.
- 2. Use the shovel to cut clay into four pieces around the peg (to flip over later). This makes the job of turning easier. You will want to turn an area of about a foot in front, behind and on each side of the peg.
- 3. Now sprinkle water on the surface of the clay (every time you turn it.) unless it is sopping wet. The cuts you made in the clay help some of the water to get down under the clay. If the clay is hard it needs sprinkled twice, if it is medium it only needs sprinkled once, if wet or soft do not sprinkle, just smooth and make surface less wet.
- 4. Now turn the clay, shovel down to about ½ the depth of the clay. A turning that just skims under the clay does not keep the clay bed loose and soft.
- 5. After turning over the clay, do not pat it down or stomp on the clay, this hardens the surface, defeating the turning process. Shave off the high spots of the clay and place in the low spots. Let the pitching of the shoes settle the clay down gradually while pitching.
- 6. **Important!** If the clay feels just right, it still will dry out if not sprinkled and turned each game.
- 7. **Keep the clay sloping toward the back of the pit,** half an inch higher in front of the peg than behind the peg, so the horseshoe does not jump BACK after hitting the peg. Bring clay from back to the front of the court when needed.
- 8. Do not water the top of the clay after it has been turned. Always turn water under.

NOTE! Just like it is unsportsmanlike to distract your opponent by some means, it is not right to over wet the clay to cause your opponent poor pitching conditions. Bill Paddock

Statistician Report:

As of September 7, 2008 we have held 109 sanctioned tournaments in Northern California. A total of 2,324 people pitched in these tournaments. That rounds out to 21.32 pitchers in each tournament. How many of us feel like we are that 0.32 person when we have a bad day pitching?

Our members also pitched in 38 tournaments outside the NCHPA area. There were 159 of our pitchers in these tournaments, including 56 in the State Tournament, 11 in the World Tournament finals and 1 in the Championship round. This made for a total of 147 tournaments and 2,483 pitchers.

Some of the clubs are using HS Master to set up your tournaments. There has been a problem with sending me the results from this program. Gail Sluys has been talking to Paul Stewart about this and he has sent her information on how to create this report from HS Master. If you need this information, contact Gail Sluys. The only problem I have with this report is that it does not include the high percent games for each pitcher. Leon Moore figured out a way to add this to the report.

All of the information to determine the winners for Pitcher of the Year Awards and other awards has been sent in. At our annual meeting this year we will be discussing the possibility of changing the way we determine these winners. This is just one of the things that every club should be involved in. Each club should make an effort to have at least one member present at that meeting. Don't let just a handful of people make all the decisions for all of us. Lee Roy Lassiter

Club News

Madera Club: Rippetoe Brothers Strike Gold in Idaho. Harlen and Othal Rippetoe won the horseshoe pitching gold medal in doubles competition at the Western Police and Fire Games held August 23, &24, 2008, in Boise, Idaho. The Western States Police and Fire Games are held annually and attract competitors from 13 Western States. In horseshoe singles play Harlen won the silver medal and Othal won the gold. Both

brothers are Nor-Cal members, Harlen from the Madera club and Othal from the Sacramento club.

In addition to the horseshoe competition both brothers, were inducted into the Western States Police and Fire Games Hall of Fame at a ceremony held on August 19, 2008. The brothers were the first ever correctional peace officers and horseshoe pitchers to be inducted into the Hall of Fame.

The Rippetoe brothers have been participating in the Police and Fire Games for the past 18 years and have won gold medals in Canada, Australia, and the United States. Both Harlen and Othal are past Nevada, Arizona, and California state champions. The brothers enjoy the competition of other law-enforcement athletics and serve as ambassadors for the sport of horseshoes in state and world events.

The horseshoe event was sponsored by the Boise Horseshoe Club and long time Sacramento horseshoe pitchers Jerry Smith and Don Titcomb provided the statistical and scorekeeping support. Both Don and Jerry expressed a big hello to all the Nor-Cal members.

Indian Valley has just finished up another league. I think it is our 26th sanctioned league we have had in our club. We had the worst turnout that we have ever had. I cannot even count all the forfeits with no shows this year. We need to do something to get the players to show up and make it more important to them on just one night a week.

Indian Valley is going to start a program next year and pass the word to the schools that any Junior that would like to try horseshoes for the first time IVHP'S will buy there annual card. That way they can try it without costing them a thing and if they don't like it they have not lost anything. I think possibly there are kids out there that would maybe love to try it but do not have the money to sign up.

The league was led again most of the year by the team of Engelmine, but with all the forfeits Village Drug edged them out in the final night by having 9 games forfeited to them. I guess it did all work out as Engelmine had 9 games forfeited to them the week before.

Forebay Park: Our club has acquired an office trailer, set up close to the pits. This is where we will store all of our hardware, tools, etc.

It is also set up for a computer to do the stats during a tournament. Our club now has 20 members of which only 17 are full card members; including 4 Junior pitchers.

The sprinkler system and lawn has really made a big improvement to the courts, thanks again to Rick Eddy & Kim Stovall.

Our sanctioned league [97-C-04] went very well. The league (this year) started April 17 and ended on the 28th. of August. I sent in the application for the National Top Ten awards of which we have four members eligible.

Our Junior League started last year with 4 members. This year again we had 4 members. There seems to be too many other junior activities in our area to get more juniors. We keep trying!

We hosted four great tournaments this year and look forward to next year. Our results of our tournaments on the 23rd. and 24th. of August are as follows:

I think our biggest problem and other clubs too; is getting good score keepers. We had some

beginners that had a difficult time, that kind of slowed things down a little.

One of the things that I did during the Calif. State Championships was go online to see how the tournament was going. NOTHING! I was disappointed. Have the results ever been posted during this annual tournament? I did hear on Monday that NCHPA members did well. It would be great to read about it *during* the tournament. (Like the World Tournament)

We have sent in our request for tournament dates for 2009 and I urge all clubs to send theirs in, so the committee has lots of time to work it out before the printing of the tournament schedule.

DATES: October 11th & 12th 2008 LOCATION: Tri-Valley Club

- 1. ENTRY FEE: \$80.00 per team. This is a 2-day event and pre-registration is required.
- 2. Teams may be mixed, may include juniors (but may not be all juniors), and must have 4 players per team. Each team may register 1 alternate player to be used in case of injury,
- 3. All players must be NCHPA members and be a member or associate member of the club they represent.

 All participants must wear appropriate name shirts of the club they represent.
- **4.** Day One Tournament play will consist of 7-30 shoe, count-all games using an 80% handicap. Qualifying starting times to be on Saturday, at 9:00A.M, 11:30A.M and 2:00 P.M if we have a full field of 24 teams. The finals will consist of the top 8 teams from the qualifying rounds carrying over their qualifying totals to be played at 10:00A.M. Sunday. The 2-day points total will determine final standings, including bonuses. Finals will be 7-40 shoe, count-all games using an 80% handicap with 20 bonus points for each player win and 40 points for each team that wins 3 or more games in any single round. All teams should plan to play on Sunday because the first alternate team will replace any team not able to return for the Sunday finals.
- 5. Prize money will be determined by the number of teams entered and will be announced.

A maximum of 24 teams will be fielded in 3 shifts – 9:00 A.M, 11:30A.M, and 2:00P.M. We must have even numbers of teams: 16, 20, and 24 in order for each participant to play 7 games. Each day will count as a separate tournament because they are played under different formats. Pitchers are required to pay scorekeepers .50 cents per game each day.
