Pitchers, I hope everyone had a nice Thanksgiving and a nice Christmas as well. First I want to say congratulations to Ken Woolery for being inducted to the NCHPA Hall of Fame this year at the awards dinner. Nice job Ken, your one of my best competitors these last few years. I think you have pitched 4 80% games against me in 2011. At the meeting, all clubs present were handed out courtsanctioned papers that stated the hints and guidelines you need to make sure all your courts are correct. Stakes are 14-15 inches in height, with a 3-inch forward lean, stakes are 40 feet apart, as well as the foul lines the correct distance from the opposite stake. For those of you that received the paperwork from Casey Sluys, please fill it out and mail it to him. We could not have made it easier for you other than take all the measurements ourselves. A selfaddressed stamped envelope was included with your packet. I had noticed this past year that some of the clubs I have been to courts are off as much as 5 inches further than the 40 feet apart they should be. In my opinion, our courts at Northern clubs do not have to be in perfect measurement, but within an inch of 40 feet as long as the foul lines are the correct distance from the opposing stake. #### **Statisticians Report**

In 2011 we held a total of 131 NCHPA Sanctioned Tournaments. There were a total of 2,717 pitchers in those tournaments. We made 189,004 ringers while pitching 650,650 horseshoes. That made an average ringer percentage of 29.05%.

A total of 83 NCHPA members pitched in 22 tournaments in Southern California, Arizona, Nevada, Oregon, Louisiana and Hawaii. Our members made 6,488 ringers while pitching 22,594 horseshoes in those sanctioned tournaments for an average of 28.72%.

Of our 420 members in 2011 we had 364 who actually pitched in at least one tournament. Eight members, or 2.20%, had high games between 80% and 90% (2 members had a 90% game). Seventeen, or 4.67%, had high games between 70% and 78%. Thirty-one, or 8.52%, had high games between 60% and 68.75%. Fifty-nine, or 16.21%, had high games between 50% and 59.38%. Seventy-three, or 20.06%, had high games between 40% and 48%. Sixty-three, or 17.31%, had high games between 30% and 39.29%. Forty-nine, or 13.46%, had high games between 20% and 29.55%. Forty-two, or 11.54%, had high games between 12% and 18.75%. Twenty-two, or 6.04%, had high games between 3.13% and 10%.

Counting <u>all</u> sanctioned tournaments they pitched in, no matter where the tournament was held, the members who pitched in the most tournaments are as follows; Wayne George - 34, Travis Sluys - 30, Richard Robbins - 30, Fritz Oberst - 28, Delia Garza - 28, Ken Woolery - 26, Alan Trusty - 24, Joe Sciarra - 24 and Don Kies - 24.

The 10 members with the "ending" highest average for the year of 2011 are as follows; Ken Woolery (Elder) - 68.54%, Rick Bermingham (Men) - 67.90%, Ed Cortez (Elder) - 67.17%, Elaine Butcher (Women) - 67.00%, Don Kies (Elder) - 62.60%, Alan Trusty (Elder) - 62.30%, Leon Moore (Elder) - 61.69%, Tom Web (Elder) - 61.52%, Dave Loucks (Elder) 61.40% and Kimmy Stockli

(Women) - 60.66%. Alas, all the rest of us pitched less than 60.66%.

#### RECRUITING

There are some pictures posted on the NHPA Forum, of an abandoned set of horseshoe pits, they could be YOLO; they're not, but that is a stark example of what will happen throughout the NCHPA IF we do not begin recruiting some new, younger people into this sport. The following are three additional comments from that forum.

#### Gary Roberts, OH:

Unfortunately, in my 53 years of pitching I have witnessed the demise of many horseshoe clubs and facilities. These include Lancaster, Washington C. H., Wilmington, Leesburg, Waverly, Lakeside, and Norwood just to name a few. The reason for this is simple. There are usually two or three people who do all of the work. When these persons age and are no longer able to continue the club dies. The number of people willing to sacrifice several hours per week to make the club successful is few in number. Successful clubs are the key to maintaining NHPA membership and tournament participation.

The loss of the Lancaster club was very disappointing in that several major tournaments were held there, and the courts were in full view of a major highway. Lakeside and Norwood also hosted major tournaments for many years.

I have great respect for tournament directors and league directors I know who have spent countless hours making it possible for the rest of us to enjoy pitching.

#### Anonymous:

In my 36 years of pitching I have observed and heard it stated that if you have 10% of your members willing to help run tournaments, leagues or maintain your courts you are lucky. Some of the best in ground courts in MO, Kansas City, had to be abandoned because of the reasons stated by Gary plus the fact that the neighborhood became what most considered an unsafe area.

It is hard to believe that those that only want to come and pitch don't realize that certain work must be done to continue having organized pitching on their courts.

How can we recruit pitchers who are interested in the facility? Historically we would have to get 50 new ones to get 5 who would do the work. Sad!

#### Larry Colette, KS

No truer words spoken by all here on this topic!!! Here are some suggestions for Club officers, Tournament directors and League directors, which in many cases one or two persons are all of the above. Most new members do not have a clue what all goes into keeping a court complex up, let alone how much preparation goes into hosting events and running leagues in an orderly fashion. Good communication is a key to educating everyone in each of your clubs about these issues and no better way to do it than by having a good e-mail address group for all club members. This eliminates the number of phone calls made to contact all your membership about preparations they

can help with prior to upcoming events as well as help during the event itself.

Court complexes are no different than your home or vehicle-- they require on-going maintenance to keep them in good condition and by addressing issues as they come up it is easy to stay on top things. I would suggest that every year prior to the outdoor pitching season getting started, that each club send an e-mail to all members asking for volunteers on one or two weekends to help get the courts ready for the new season.

On large court complexes where all the courts are not used for one night of league or tournaments, directors should alternate the courts each week so that all courts get used every two or three week periods. This helps keep the clay in good playing condition throughout the season. No better way to keep clay in good condition than for it to be watered and pitched on. This saves a lot of hard backbreaking work to get courts in shape prior to your tournaments. Encourage your club members to use different courts each practice session as this also helps. Good clay must be watered to keep it in a putty like consistency. The absolute worst thing you can do on a clay court is not give it a good drink of water before you back after finishing ир

With a little guidance such as this through good communications the Club officers and tournament /league directors can have a positive influence on all club members without having to beg for help. You will be surprised how this approach will get folks out to help with projects that will keep your club strong well into the future. You will have members who feel they have ownership in the facility and take pride in being a member of a club that is run like a well-oiled machine. Not everyone can be there for every time, but they will be there when they can and that's what is important. It sure beats one or two individuals trying to do it all.

Just in my 26 years as a member, of the NCHPA, I have seen the demise of Colusa, Yuba Sutter, Oakland, San Francisco, Shasta, Rio Dell, McKinleyville, Lincoln, Reedley, Arroyo Viejo, Redwood Empire, Seaside, Placer and Yolo. Granted we have had new clubs spring up. Like, Tulare, Pollock Pines, Tuolumne, Madera, Exeter and now the new revitalized San Francisco club.

Thank God for the work of a few dedicated younger generation horseshoe pitchers with a true love for the game! Let's teach the younger people and train them into the inner workings of this organization. They are our future. And you 40's to 60 year olds in our organization that are reading this; please step up, take the initiative and learn the inner workings of a tournament. The future of this whole organization belongs to YOU. Us ol' farts will gladly make room for any of you that show the initiative and take some responsibility.

As we all know, the loss of the Yolo courts was a huge loss as it had ample courts and was centrally located. The closing has weighed heavily on all of our membership and officers. At the NCHPA annual meeting we had the pleasure of hearing an idea from Fortuna member, Bill Paddock, regarding building a facility that could hold a State Tournament. (see article on page 11) Our president, Harlen Rippetoe, appointed a committee to be chaired by Lee Roy Lassiter to explore the proposal. I would like to thank Bill for putting forward a suggestion to consider.

After Bill's presentation, it motivated me to look into a proposal that Tom Latino was working on to increase the number of courts at Granite Park before the economy tanked. To give you a little background, Sacramento's Granite Park currently has eight courts. The City of Sacramento has designated the land adjacent to our courts for twelve additional courts. The cost of this project was projected at \$10,000 which includes fencing and lights. We will be reviewing the documents to see if the project is still feasible. Our understanding is that the City will permit us to perform the labor and that our volunteers would sign a release of liability. This and other details would need to be verified. We have some talented NCHPA members who have offered their assistance. Thus, after we speak with the City and learn if the project is feasible - we will then put forth a plan to raise funds. Ten donors each donating \$1,000 or twenty donors donating \$500 or other fundraising efforts including grants will be explored. While this would be nice for the Sacramento Club to expand its size, a greater benefit is that the NCHPA would have a facility in Northern California that could also host the State or NCHPA Championships. Granite Park has ample parking, restaurants and camping facilities nearby, plus other recreation from the theatre to fishing. Not to

mention, geographically Granite Park is in the center of our NCHPA area making it somewhat equitable in travel time for our most southern and northern NCHPA members and is less than two miles from Highway 50 making accessible. So thank you to Bill Paddock for his presentation as we hope it inspires everyone to explore some viable alternatives and to Tom Latino for laying the groundwork. If you have ideas, please send them to Harlen Rippetoe as a strong membership working together can problem solve with success. We will keep you posted. *Cathy Kauffman*

## If you are a NCHPA member, Skip this, You already know, but please show this to interested non members.

My Father in-law gave me my first set of horseshoes. They were picnic shoes. I placed a couple of stakes in the ground and we started playing. I soon fell in love with the game and found myself to be pretty good. My two pits consisted of dirt and beach sand. They soon developed a huge valley at the entrance of the pits, which because I throw a flip and far too short, my shoes would slide straight for the stake whether I was to the right or the left. A fouled shoe did not exist in my horseshoe world. While working at Varian in Palo Alto, a co worker gave me information on where to buy horseshoes. That led to me finding out about organized tournaments and there was a club not far from my home. I quickly drove over to the courts and was thrilled to see them. A sign said they met on Thursday. I joined as soon as possible, it was in August, but unfortunately I did not have enough time to get me qualified for the State Tournament, so I had to wait over a year to compete in it.

Land Proposal As many of you know my working background has been as a real estate broker selling large and small parcels of land.
